ABOUT THE WOMEN'S HALL OF FAME



Hall of Fame Pin

Each of our inductees will receive a Hall of Fame pin. The pin is an original piece of art crafted by Yasmin Brown, a local artist and past HOF award recipient. Each pin is a unique and one-of-a-kind creation, just like the person receiving it.

The pin base is made of multicolored dichroic glass, which provides a variety of colors and effects. This uniqueness of the base represents the individuality of the award recipient. The image on the pin represents three qualities of the recipient. The diamond shape at the base of the image symbolizes the strong foundation of the recipient. The raised arms signify the recipient's innate strength, while the heart shape of the arms represents the recipient's kindness and warmth. And, the shape of the reaching arms represents the recipient's warmth and caring.

The Lebanon County Commission for Women (LCCW) began celebrating Women's History Month by publishing articles about women of historical significance in Lebanon County. However, during their research, they discovered that the contributions of women to improve the quality of life in the county were not adequately recognized. In addition, the commission faced a shortage of funds for projects that would benefit women and girls in the community, as they relied on the county budget.

In 2009, Commission Member Bev Heishman researched Women's Hall of Fame projects from other county commissions throughout the U.S. and along with Chair, Cindy Heisey, the idea was presented to the remaining members, who recognized its potential and implemented it as a source of revenue.

The first LCCW Hall of Fame Luncheon was held on March 10, 2010, marking the 30th anniversary of National Women's History Month. These women are honored and their stories are recorded and posted on the commission's web page to preserve their place in history.

Additionally, the funds raised from this event are used to finance commission projects. Over the years, the funds have supported various initiatives, such as the Susan Funk Klarsch Memorial Garden at Deer Run, H.O.P.E.S. Family Shelter, the Lebanon Historical Society, Girls on the Run, Heart and Soul Program, Junior Achievement, a mentoring program for young women in the community, and the Women's Empowerment Scholarship, which enables local high school graduates to pursue a post-high school degree or certification.

Alicia Richards co-anchors ABC27's evening newscasts. She also does special reporting throughout the year. Most recently, Alicia was focused on the opioid crisis, winning a Keystone Media Award for her coverage.

When Alicia turned her attention to domestic violence, she won an Emmy award after revealing that Pennsylvania does not track how judges rule in these cases. She was also the Pennsylvania Association of Broadcasters television broadcaster of the year in 2020.

Alicia interviewed the first female CEO of The Hershey Company, Michele Buck. Alicia traveled to Kosovo to report on the Pennsylvania National Guard's peacekeeping efforts. She accompanied heart specialists from Penn State Hershey Medical Center on a life-saving medical mission to Ecuador. She covered the 2016 Democratic and 2000 Republican National Conventions.

Alicia spent a decade advocating for breast cancer awareness. Her Buddy Check 27 series won two Pennsylvania Association of Broadcaster awards and she and her mother Karen appeared in public service announcements promoting the importance of early detection. In addition, Alicia was awarded a first-place Associated Press award for "Lori's Story," a moving 10-part series on a local woman's determined battle against breast cancer.

Alicia takes great pride in her extensive involvement with the Central Pennsylvania community through regular speaking engagements. Travel is one of her primary interests. With her family, she has gone on safari in Africa and has been to Egypt, Russia, Argentina and throughout Europe. Alicia and her partner of 25 years, Elise, have a Goldendoodle named Moxie.

Kerry Royer has served as the Mount Gretna Art Show Director since 2018. She works year-round to bring 200+ artisans to this annual event. For the 50th Mount Gretna Art Show in 2024, Kerry secured support from the community to celebrate this milestone with public art projects. She collaborated with the Pennsylvania Chautauqua, Mount Gretna Arts Council, Lebanon County Commissioners, and Mount Gretna United Methodist Church to commission installations for the "Year of the Arts."

One of the projects Kerry helped to bring to fruition during the 50th celebration event was the Mount Gretna International Film Festival (MtGIFF). The film festival represents an all-encompassing art form. The film festival was launched in honor of Lebanon native Michael Evan Deitzler. In addition, she partnered with photographer Shannon Fretz to publish

the coffee table book, "The Porches of Mount Gretna."

Kerry leads the Penn State College of Medicine Center Stage Arts in Health Program. She creatively uses the power of the arts and music to nourish patient and employee well-being. Kerry also directs the Community Art Gallery at Penn State Health. Recently she curated art in two Behavioral Health Clinic locations. Her engagement in the arts continues to provide opportunities for women and children to be exposed to and involved in the arts.

Kerry earned a master's degree in art education from Penn State and a graduate certificate in arts in medicine from the University of Florida. She serves as vice chair of the Visit Lebanon Valley Board and sits on the Mount Gretna United Methodist Church Endowment Committee and the Mount Gretna Arts Council.

Caitlin Kurtz, Pastor at Zion's Lutheran Church in Jonestown and President of the Northern Lebanon Ministerium, holds a BA in religious studies from the University of Virginia and a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Gettysburg. Initially serving as a pastor in New Kingstown, she joined Zion's in 2016, a region with extreme poverty and limited resources. Caitlin engages both within and outside church walls to support residents.

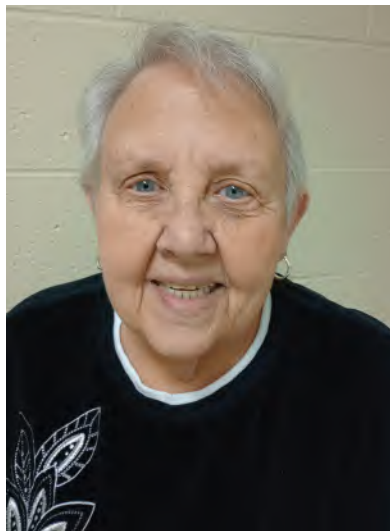
Upon her arrival, she noted that the Northern Lebanon School District (NLSD) had four elementary schools partnering with local congregations. The closure of these schools in favor of a consolidated one prompted her to foster collaboration among district congregations, leading to the formation of the Northern Lebanon Ministerium in January 2023. This 501(c)(3) organization aims to address the physical and spiritual needs of the community through various initiatives, such as providing gifts, transporting

Power Packs, offering education, and organizing community events.

The Ministerium also runs programs like Back to School Blessings, which supplies students with clothing and school items, and the NL Clothing Closet, offering free clothing. Caitlin's advocacy extends to planning seminars for aging individuals' care, supporting special needs children's education, and establishing a Compassion Fund for essential community needs. She empowers volunteers and collaborates with charities, including Joy Food Pantry and Lutheran World Relief.

Moreover, Caitlin mediates conflicts within church organizations and county leadership, works to enhance the lives of women and girls, and mentors youth, especially females. Her leadership inspires others, fostering community unity and action. With her belief in collective effort, Caitlin identifies and nurtures talents in others, driving both obvious and subtle change.

Dianne Marquette is a Myerstown native and has always wanted to help her community thrive. Destined to be active in community events, as a teenager, she was crowned "Miss Myerstown" in 1962. Dianne owned and operated the Orchard in Mt. Aetna and established an Apple Festival with 40 vendors and activities. Eventually, The Orchard was renamed Expressions, was popular with a gift shop, and floral designs, and then a bridal shop.

Despite working seven days a week, Dianne found time to actively participate in the Myerstown Junior Woman's Club, where she became president. Today with almost 50 years of membership, she is still active in the Myerstown (Senior) Woman's Club where she currently serves as president. Under her direction, the Club has grown and flourished. Through her oversight she has left her mark though revamping Myerstown's holiday festivities.

Dianne is an active volunteer in other

areas including working as a Majority Inspector at the election polls, assisting with media promotions for Myerstown events, and her church. She also found the time that led to the fostering of new relationships with the ELCO School District, innovating ideas for funding the Myerstown Library, collaborating with other community groups including On Fire Ministry as well as increased financial support for all local fire companies.

She is an accomplished musician. Dianne taught piano and organ and accompanies choral groups and soloists. She currently serves as an organist and choir director at Mary Gate of Heaven Church in Myerstown. Dianne strives to bring multi-generations of women together for common goals and has helped to foster new networks and friendships. Dianne is committed to making a positive impact leading by example, building confidence and self-esteem for girls and women.

WOMEN SERVING THE MILITARY

Bonnie Loy was born and raised in Ebenezer, Lebanon County. After graduating from Cedar Crest High School, she attended the Lebanon County Vo-Tech, where she completed the Practical Nurse Program.

Bonnie has had a career serving the veterans of Lebanon County. She retired as Manager of Respiratory Therapy after working for 32 years at the Lebanon VA Medical Center. During her service at the VA, Bonnie achieved her certification from the American Board of Disability Analysts and volunteered her time and personal resources to aid veterans which she continues to this day.

Bonnie participates in various community volunteer organizations. She has been a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) since 1988 and has been involved and recognized with awards. Bonnie assists women aspiring to join DAR by researching their ancestry and connection to the Revolutionary War. Presently, she serves

as the DAR Chapter Regent and is part of the President General's Project for the next three years.

One of Bonnie's activities includes bringing "Wreaths Across America" to Covenant Greenwood Ebenezer Cemetery, where 1,200 veterans are interred, in 2019. Through her oversight and collaboration with the Ebenezer Beautification Committee, the Ebenezer Fire Company, and her church, the event continues.

Bonnie contributes to local historic preservation efforts by collaborating with various organizations to maintain Lebanon County's heritage. She serves as Co-Chair of the Lebanon County 250th Committee. Her interest in history and community service includes participation in projects focused on highlighting and preserving historical narratives.

WOMEN FOSTERING ADVANCEMENTS IN STEM

After graduating from Lebanon Valley College in 1974 with a B.S. in Mathematics, Deborah Buckfelder relocated to Palmyra. She began her career as a math teacher at Palmyra Area Middle School. While obtaining her master's degree at Penn State University, she concentrated on teaching methods that facilitated the students' understanding of algebra through the transition from concrete to abstract concepts. Deborah instilled a love of math and STEM in her students. She was pivotal in encouraging and mentoring girls to pursue further mathematics and STEM education and careers.

In addition to her academic role, she coached cross country and track, focusing on leadership and teamwork. Deborah empowered her female students, showing them how to be strong women.

Deborah is an elected leader of the Capital Area Beekeepers Association. She has aided the local environment

with her bee hives. Deborah has used her knowledge of beekeeping and the process of pollination to educate students and community members.

In her retirement, she volunteers as a Board Member on the Palmyra Public Library Board of Directors. Deborah provides leadership by advancing STEM Education for members of all ages through programs and resources. Her mathematical expertise was instrumental in the success of the Library's Capital Campaign to retire its mortgage debt.

Deborah is a member of the Palmyra Garden Club. She helps maintain the flower garden at the Palmyra Public Library and assists with organizing and planning the Annual Flower Show. She also participates in the Garden Club's monthly instructional programs.

Alissa Mailen Perrotto

Alissa Mailen Perrotto is the President/CEO of the Sexual Assault Resource & Counseling Center (SARCC) of Lebanon & Schuylkill Counties. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Social Science Economics and Philosophy, with a concentration in Women's Studies from the University of Scranton and a master's degree in Community Psychology and Social Change from the Pennsylvania State University.

Ali's career has included work at local, state, and national levels. She began as a Child Advocate for The Sexual Assault Resource and Counseling Center (SARCC). In this role, Ali met regularly with children and their families who had experienced sexual violence and abuse. She frequently traveled to Harrisburg to accompany families to their Children's Advocacy Center interviews before such a center was established in Lebanon County. During her tenure, SARCC established a Therapy Department to serve clients with significant needs.

In 2019, under Ali's leadership, SARCC was named Non-Profit of the Year by the Lebanon Valley Chamber of Commerce. Ali has played a key role in making SARCC a trauma-informed and anti-oppression agency, aiming to change community norms in Lebanon for future generations. Her inclusive standards ensure SARCC supports survivors and works to prevent long-term violence in Lebanon County.

Ali also received the Children's Champion Award from the UPMC Children's Advocacy Center of Central Pennsylvania, recognizing her contributions to children's protection, treatment, education, and welfare. Additionally, Ali is a founding member of the Lebanon Chapter of NAACP and served as chair of the Lebanon County Commission for Women.

TRAILBLAZERS



Doris Iannicelli

Posthumously

Doris "Dolly" Iannicelli, who was a long-term resident of Lebanon County, began her volunteer work in the 1950s by joining the Women & Girls Committee of the YMCA. This committee collaborated with the Director to plan and expand opportunities for girls and women at the Girl's Department of the Y. When the director left in 1960, Dolly took over the role until a new hire was made, which did not occur. She retired in 1985 after 25 years, during which she and the committees expanded programs such as a Babysitting Course, Beat the Blahs, Holiday for Homemakers, and a Day Camp.

In 1978, Dolly initiated senior exercise programs at the Senior Center and Steven's Towers. By 1981, she started a Senior Aquacise program despite initial resistance from the male aquatics director, teaching the classes herself with the help of a lifeguard. Another organization where she contributed was the Good Samaritan Hospital, serving two terms as Auxiliary President and

being part of the Corporate Affiliate Board of Directors from 1995 to 2014. In the early 1990s, she advocated for a community-wide health improvement initiative, leading to the establishment of the Lebanon County Community Health Council which has continued to operate for over 30 years, meeting the needs of the community.

For her contributions, Dolly received the 2006 Senior Recognition Award from the 50+ Festival. In her 70s, Dolly played a key role in establishing a Dental Clinic to aid children whose parents could not afford dental care. She secured space, funding, and volunteer dentists for the clinic and also volunteered herself. In 2001, Dolly was a finalist for the Governor's Silver & Gold Award and was recognized in "Giving Back - The History of the Lebanon YMCA" by Bradford Charles.

Dolly Iannicelli was committed to fostering relationships and improving community services, particularly for women and girls in Lebanon.

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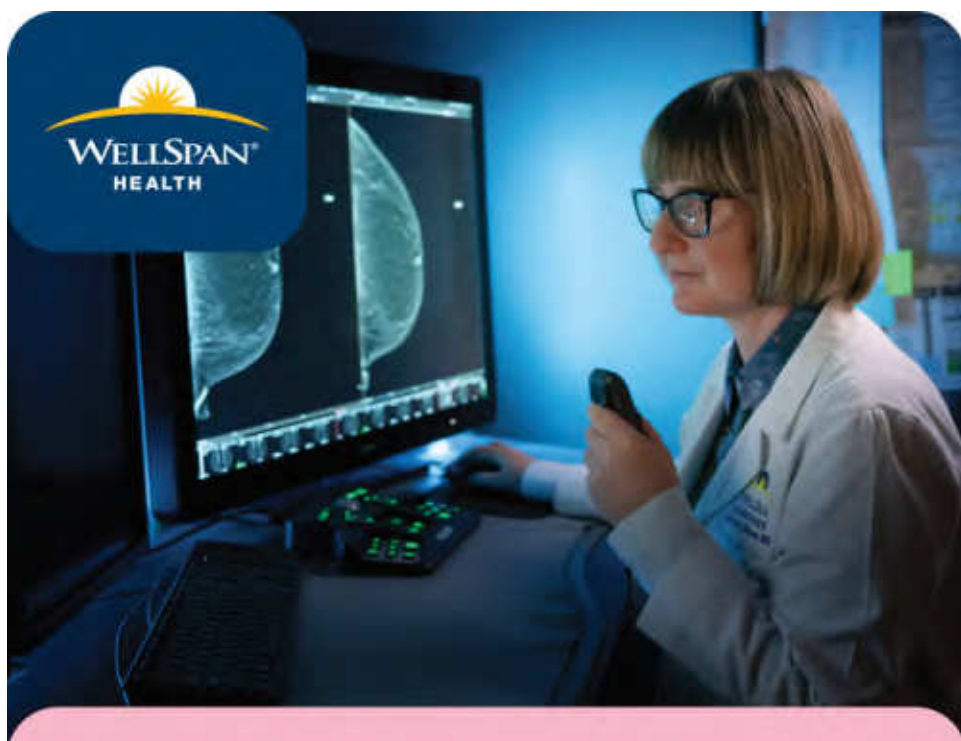
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
